As we start a new Club year and a new school year is starting, the Education & Libraries Community Service Program is a very important part of our lives and club work. The GFWC/OFWC objective of the Education & Libraries Community Service Program is to improve Literacy & Education in communities at home, around the state and around the world. Many clubs donate to their respective school programs and many schools & students look forward to these donations. There are monthly themes which clubs can recognize and take part in to make the year of Education & Libraries more fun and interesting. Here are a few monthly Education and Library themes listed for your consideration.

**September:** Library Card Sign-up Month, International Literacy Day -September 8.

**October:** National Book Month, National Day on Writing-October 20, Teen Read Week (always the same week as Columbus Day)

November: National Author's Day-Nov 1, National Education Week-second full week

**December:** Give books to all ages as gifts, maybe magazines to retirement homes.

January: Lifelong Literacy in Americas Month, National mentoring Month

February: Library Lovers Month, World Read Aloud Day-February 5

March: Read Across America Month, Read Across America Day-March 2 (Dr. Seuss's Birthday)

**April:** National Library Week -2024 April 7-14(Second week in April), National DEAR Day (**D**rop **E**verything **A**nd **R**ead-April 12

**May:** Teacher Appreciation Week (May 6-10, 2024) always the first full week in May. Teacher Appreciation Day is May 7.

June: Audiobook Appreciation Month

Fall is a good time to have book reading groups in you club, join ESO and take part in the ESO Activities and support your local library. Encourage all members to have a library card and use it often.

They can sometimes work the essay into their curriculum. Make copies of the rules and present them and set a date for picking up the essays. (You might call and remind teachers about three or four weeks before the due date.

Her essay was then sent on to the GFWC District Contest and then to the State Contest where each time it won First Place. Marleana received Certificates and monetary gifts. Marleana is the daughter of Kayla Disney. The GFWC Ripley Women's Club is very proud of Marleana Highfield. Her essay is as follows:

# "The Bees and Me-How We Help Each Other Out"

Bees are dying all over the world. This is important because if all the bees die then the plants wouldn't be pollinated, and if the plants don't get pollinated then we could go into a food shortage. Most foods that we eat are pollinated by bees.

The bees are dying because they are abandoning their hives after they were destroyed, so they had nowhere to live. Current scientific research indicates that parasites and the diseases they carry, are the main threat to the lives of honey bees. Weakened immune systems leave hives susceptible to bacterial and viral diseases as well. Also, the farmers have been plowing up the wildflowers and pesticide use is massively increased.

There are many reasons why we need bees. We need bees to pollinate our plants so we wouldn't have a food shortage. Bees help with many forms of life. Also, bees help make some medicine. Bees even help law enforcement; they were fitted with sensors to detect explosives.

Bees are dying all over the world. We can help the bees by stopping plowing up wildflowers and stop using pesticides. We can buy local raw honey to help support beekeepers and their honey.

### Health and Wellness Community Service Program by Debbie Weaver, Chairman

The objective is to improve wellbeing by addressing nutrition, disease prevention and physical & emotional care. Your club is asked to explore opportunities for awareness and advancement of these areas in and outside of your community.

So, let's Get Fit Within our Communities – fit in body, in mind, and in spirit. Educate, practice, and promote the three fundamental areas of this Community Service Program. The following are examples from last year's top 10 GFWC winners in this category.

Physical and/or emotional support-projects such as developing a calm space for those with sensory issues to take respite in a noisy environment, such as a festival; maintaining fitness trails; acting as cheerleaders for Special Olympics events, or providing emotional support for female prisoners.

Disease Prevention examples: Handing out forms to the community for people to keep track of all medications and other health information for all individuals living in a household; making wigs out of yarn for children who have hair loss from medical treatments; getting information out to the community on awareness of diseases, such as breast or ovarian cancer to improve chances of early detection.

Nutrition examples: Design a handout on nutritional information and include it to all Meals on Wheels recipients; provide nutritional meals to underserved populations who may not be able to afford healthy foods.

Our GFWC Health and Wellness Chairman, Dale Fisher, said that there is confusion about where to report some projects. She said to remember that projects for the needy, hungry, and homeless, such as support for homeless shelters, food pantries, and food drives should be reported under Civic Engagement and Outreach. The Health & Wellness CSP focuses more on nutrition - educating club members and the community in making wise choices and healthy eating habits.

### WHAT DO THE CLUB'S BYLAWS SAY?

### Barbara D. Whitaker, PRP GFWC Ohio Parliamentarian

Has anyone looked at the club's bylaws lately to see if they are ready for the New Year? Is the quorum small enough? The quorum should be a number, not a percentage, and should be a few members less than the average attendance at a regular meeting.

What about the meeting date? Did the club start meeting on a different day but never amended the bylaws to reflect that? The time and place of the meeting should be in the Standing Rules so it can be more easily changed. The day should be in the bylaws. What allowances do the bylaws make for holidays or important events such as the town's festival? What about declared emergencies or inclement weather? Is the president or the executive committee allowed to change the date or cancel the meeting in an emergency? Are the committees and the club allowed to hold electronic meetings? And how is voting conducted, if so? Email is not an acceptable form of meeting and voting. Phone conferences, Google Meets, Zoom, Facebook Live, or any platform where everyone can at least HEAR each other is acceptable. Rules of conduct for such meetings should be in the standing rules.

Bylaws and Standing Rules are just a part of a club's parliamentary base. Having a "parliamentary point" at each meeting is a good way to help members learn parliamentary procedures. It can take less than five minutes a month and, in the future, save hours. Some free or inexpensive tools can be found at parliamentarians.org in the "bookstore," such as *The Parliamentary Education Toolkit* and *Parliamentary Fun and Games. Robert's Rules of Order in Brief, 3<sup>rd</sup> edition*, is a quick-read reference for any member. Clubs can have more social time or adjourn earlier by learning how to conduct effective and efficient business meetings.

# **GFWC/Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs Scholarships** by Harriett Groh Chairman, Scholarship Trustees

Arthur Fletcher, deceased former head of the United Negro College Fund coined the well- known phrase "A mind is a terrible thing to waste". We the members of the "The GFWC/Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs provided a wonderful opportunity to graduating high school seniors who want to further their education following high school. This article is intended to give a brief summary of the scholarships. Please see the Pages the 2022-2024 GFWC/Ohio Federation of Women's Club Directory for full details and instructions. Clubs are encouraged to contact their local high school guidance counselors to make them aware of the following scholarship opportunities.

There are five scholarships administered by a single rotating Board of Trustees. Each district selects one Trustee to serve a four-year term. The Chairman is appointed by the GFWC/Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs Board of Directors to serve for the two years of the administration. The scholarship amounts are determined each year.

The Ethel G. Swanbeck Scholarship is awarded to a graduating high school senior pursuing a course of study in the Allied Health Field and enrolled at an accredited Ohio college or university. The student may use the scholarship for a degree as a nurse, pharmacist, X-ray technician, physical therapist, laboratory technician, premedical studies, pre-veterinary studies, etc. Applicants for this scholarship must have a grade point average of 3.0 or better.

**The Elaine Weinman Memorial Scholarship** is awarded to a graduating high school senior pursuing a course of study in the field of Communication Arts at an accredited Ohio college, university or technical school. "Communication Arts" is defined as including speech, journalism, drama, radio and television. Applicants for this scholarship must have a grade point average of **3.0 or better.** 

The Annette Phelps Lincoln Scholarship is awarded to a graduating high school senior with a grade point average of 3.0 or better. It is limited to the teaching and/or library professions at an accredited Ohio college or university.

The GFWC/Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs Art Scholarship will be awarded to a graduating high school senior enrolled at an accredited Ohio art school, college or university. Applicants for this scholarship must have a grade point average of **2.6** or better.

The GFWC/Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs, "Clubwoman Scholarship" is available ONLY to a member of a per capita club federated in the GFWC/Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs. It is for those clubwomen who need additional education or training in order to join the work force or to help to provide for themselves and/or their families OR for Juniorettes who are graduating high school seniors and have a grade point of 3.0 or better. Awardees must attend an accredited Ohio College or technical school.

A club may only sponsor **ONE** candidate per scholarship per year. Sponsoring clubs are responsible to collect and submit all required documents as listed in the instructions and mail the completed file in **ONE** envelope to the Chairman (Harriett Groh) of the GFWC/Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs Scholarship Board of Trustees. All scholarship applications and documentation must be postmarked by March 1<sup>st</sup>. Thank you in advance for helping graduating seniors continue their education and help them reach their career goals.

### Memorial Shrine Brick and Paver Report by Rose Logston, Chairman

The engraved bricks and pavers sales have raised over eight thousand dollars for the Shrine and more than one hundred and sixty bricks and pavers have been placed on the walkways.

It is suggested clubs could purchase the initial paver with the club's name and federated date on it and then members could purchase an inscribed brick paver to be placed around the club paver. Sometimes as many as three club members' names can fit on one small brick paver. Passing the hat at a club function, a paperback or magazine sale at club functions, holding a fifty-fifty drawing, or having members save and donate their change are a few ways clubs could raise funds.

Three sizes of pavers are available: 4" x 8" (brick sized) 8" x 8" paver and 8" x 12" paver

Can contain up to 10 lines with 12-14 letters and spaces

OR fewer lines with a design. SPECIAL ORDER

Only one symbol per space (Punctuation marks each require one (1) space)

The ceremony will be begin at 2 p.m. at the Mohican Memorial Forest Shrine located in the Mohican Memorial State Forest near Loudonville in Ashland County. It is the seventy-sixth anniversary of the dedication of the official Ohio Memorial Shrine.

The Ohio Memorial Shrine was the first of its kind in the United States. The Ohio General Assembly authorized construction of the 32-foot by 24-foot sandstone chapel-like structure in 1945 as World War II was ending. Members of the GFWC Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs from throughout the state raised the money to build the Shrine, of all Ohio products, and it was dedicated on April 27, 1947.

Veterans will also be acknowledged and members of the Loudonville American Legion Post 257 and the American Legion Post 257 Auxiliary will take an active role in the ceremony, as they have for many years.

Rolling Thunder Chapter No. 5 will conduct a ceremony as a part of the commemoration activities.

In 1936, the president of the United States declared the last Sunday in September to be observed as Gold Star Mother's Day. In 2011, then President Obama amended the day to be "Gold Star Mother's and Family's Day."

Inside the Shrine are two "Great Books" inscribed with the names of over 26,000 Ohioan's who made the supreme sacrifice.

Over the years, members of the GFWC Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs with the help of state foresters from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources have planted more than 310,000 trees in the area as living memorials to the more than 26,000 Ohio war dead honored within the shrine. In 2008, the "Memorial Walkway" was unveiled. That walkway leads from the south side of the Shrine to the latrines, and the newer "Friends Walkway," which was dedicated in 2009 is on the north side of the Shrine and leads to the Past Presidents Grove.

Both walkways are constructed of Ohio-made bricks and pavers purchased through members of the GFWC Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs with donations and/or engraving of the bricks or pavers. Those wanting to honor or memorialize someone can order standard size bricks with up to three lines of letters or large pavers (about the size of four bricks) with graphics and letters other sizes are also available. You can send a design or pick from the engravers catalog. Rose Logston serves as state chairmen of the Bricks and Pavers Committee.

The maintenance of the Shrine is a joint initiative of ODNR and GFWC Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs, and ODNR Division of Forestry also oversees the surrounding 270-acre Memorial Park and 4,525-acre state forest. Its location, just off Route 97 and close to Route 3 was carefully selected for its easy access from all parts of the state and because of its proximity to Mohican State Forest, which was already under ODNR management.

The GFWC/Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs is an organization of more than fifty (50) clubs with members dedicated to community service through volunteer efforts. It is a non-sectarian and non-partisan organization and has members of all ages throughout Ohio. The General Federation of Women's Clubs is the largest and oldest organization of its kind.

Since there is no additional sites for a bench at the Memorial Shrine, the bench was placed in the garden of our founder's home in Springfield, Ohio.

# Welcome to the History Connection By Kim Buchwalter

To tell the history of GFWC Ohio you must begin with the history of our beloved founder, Clementine.

Clementine Cordelia Berry was born on February 8, 1843, in Danville, OH, the eldest of 7 children of Dr/Rev John Adams Berry and Eleanora Evelyn Andrews who married on March 17, 1842, in Amity, Knox Co OH. Clem's father John was born in 1821, in Knox County Ohio and received a degree in medicine and had a successful practice but left to become a Methodist Reverend. Eleanora was born in 1824, in Newville, Richland County Ohio and was educated in a Methodist academy in Amity Ohio. And like Clem, her mother was a teacher prior to being married. After John became a Reverend in 1854 the family moved to various parishes in Ohio – Roscoe, Chesterville, Fredericktown, and Delaware. Upon John's death in 1863, Eleanora moved the family back to Fredericktown.

By that time Clementine had already moved from the family home to attend school at Ohio Wesleyan Female College in Delaware Ohio and graduated in 1862 at the age of 19 with a Master of Art in Liberal Studies, it being a two-year degree at the time. She returned 50 years later in 1912 to hand out the diplomas to the graduating class.

The next 5 years Clementine was a teacher at various schools. Beginning in Columbus Public Schools for one year, then taught French & Latin for two years each at Granville Female College, OH and Quincy Female College in IL and a finally a year at Indian State Female College.

On September 1, 1868, Clementine married civil war veteran Captain Edward L Buchwalter and honeymooned in Columbus, registered at the Neil House Hotel that evening. They lived on the Buchwalter family farm for the next five years where Capt. Ed had a cottage built for them. In 1872 they moved to Springfield, Ohio.



In 1872 Clementine attended the Ohio Woman's Suffrage Convention at the Opera House in Cincinnati, where 200 were in attendance, organized and appointed officers. Clementine was elected recording secretary. Later at the 16<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention held in her hometown of Springfield, Clementine greeted the attendees and was a guest speaker. Locally Clementine became active in numerous clubs and organizations doing various

charity work. She was a member of the Mt Vernon Society, Women's Benevolent Society serving on the finance committee. Later a member of Young Women's Mission, Springfield City Federation, Pioneer Clubwomen of Ohio, and Springfield Woman's Club. In 1888 she was appointed to oversee the department of fine arts for the County Centennial Society by Asa Bushnell (who was not yet governor). That same year she was a founding member of the Traveler's Club and from this club she was sent as a delegate to the first GFWC biennial in Chicago in 1892. The seed had been planted two years prior and now it was time to grow. (Winter edition will have The History Connection – part 2)

For example, a club can sponsor a food bank, pantry, or food program to organize a volunteer activity

with fellow club members, family, and friends. Ask every member of your club to invite a friend who is not presently a member to participate and experience GFWC in action. Use the activity to motivate and inspire your friend to join. The benefits of community service not only make a person feel good, but it helps to build meaningful friendships and bonds that will last a lifetime.

Here are suggestions for NDS activities:

- Volunteer at a Local Food Bank
- Food Drives:

Connect directly with the local food bank to determine how your club can be of service. They will welcome the support and donation of time and food.

• Raise Awareness About Hunger:

Reach out to your local media to introduce NDS and the cause being promoted. Ask the reporter to mention NDS and how people can participate and donate. Also, use social media to discuss food insecurity with members of your community, clubs, schools, church groups, and others.

• Advocate to End Food Insecurity: Use GFWC's Legislative Action Center (LAC) to interact with your federal and state elected officials to advance a bill or introduce legislation that helps to end hunger by funding programs specific to the issue. Information and updates about NDS will be in the weekly electronic newsletter GFWC News & Notes, Facebook, Instagram, and website, www.GFWC.org. Every week until September 30, GFWC will make announcements, provide project ideas, and discuss food insecurity. Stay tuned for additional resources including a tool kit and a media kit.

refreshments.



bedding, and body wash for the children.



"A Candle Loses None of its Light by Lighting Another"
